- The **Association's designations will continue to stand** to accommodate members and stakeholders who use these designations as their standard requirement for employment.
- Association members who currently hold these designations can *grandfather into the College* until the deadline date of January 31, 2011. After this date, members and non-members must complete a full application and meet the College standards for eligibility to sit the examination for a specified certification level.
